COURSES

The Under Graduate Programmes are offered under Choice Based Credit Semester System. The Duration of the Programme is 6 semesters distributed in a period of 3 years. The odd semester will start in June and will end up in October and even semester will start in November and will end up in March. Each semester will have a minimum of 90 working days. For passing the degree programme, a student should have to achieve a minimum of 120 credits in three years of study.

The Under Graduate Programmes includes 4 types of courses:

A. Common Courses:

English and Languages (Malayalam / Hindi)

B. Core Courses:

All students should complete 10 to 18 core courses of 50 credits, which belong to the main subject, during their degree programme.

C. Complementary Courses:

All students should complete 24 credits of one or two disciplines, which are related to the core subject, during their degree.

D. Open Courses:

All students should study a course other than the core subjects during the 5th semester, which will have a Weightage of 4 credits.

E. Audit Course/ Ability Enhancement Course:

All Students should study this course which is mandatory as per the directions from the regulatory authorities like UGC, Supreme Court, Etc.

EVALUATION AND GRADING FOR UG REGULATION 2014

External Evaluation

External evaluation carries 80 % of marks.

External evaluation of Even (2, 4, 6) semesters will be conducted in centralized valuation camps immediately after the examination. Answer scripts of Odd Semester (1, 3, 5) examinations will be evaluated by home/centralized valuation. All question papers shall be set by the University.

The external examination in theory courses is to be conducted with question papers set by external experts. The evaluation of the answer scripts shall be done by examiners based on a well- defined scheme of valuation and answer key shall be provided by the University.

The external examination in practical courses shall be conducted by two examiners- one internal and an external, appointed by the University.

The project evaluation with viva can be conducted either internal or external which may be decided by the Board of Studies concerned.

No practical examination will be conducted in odd semester. Practical examinations shall be conducted in the even semester (II, IV and VI) as per the decision of the appropriate academic bodies.

After the external evaluation only marks are to be entered in the answer scripts.

All other calculations including grading are done by the University.

EVALUATION AND GRADING

Mark system is followed instead of direct grading for each question. For each course in the semester letter grade, grade point and % of marks are introduced in 7- point indirect grading system as per guidelines given in Annexure- I



Course Evaluation

The evaluation scheme for each course shall contain two parts.

- 1) Internal Assessment 2) External Evaluation

20% weight shall be given to the internal assessment.

The remaining 80% weight shall be for the external evaluation.

Internal Assessment

20% of the total marks in each course are for internal examinations. The marks secured for internal assessment only need to be sent to University by the colleges concerned.

The internal assessment shall be based on a predetermined transparent system involving written test / assignments / seminars / viva and attendance in respect of theory courses and lab involvement / records attendance in respect of Practical Courses.

Internal assessment of the project will be based on its content, method of presentation, final conclusion and orientation to research aptitude.

Components with percentage of marks of Internal Evaluation of Theory Courses are Attendance 25%, Assignment / Seminar / Viva 25% and Test paper 50%. For practical courses- Attendance 25%, Record 50% and lab involvement 25% as far as internal is concerned.

(If a fraction appears in internal marks, nearest whole number is to be taken)

Attendance of each course will be evaluated as below:

To ensure transparency of the evaluation process, the internal assessment marks awarded to each student in each course in a semester shall be notified on the notice board at least one week before the commencement of external examination.

There shall not be any chance for improvement for internal marks.

The course teacher(s) shall maintain the academic record of each student registered for each course, which shall be forwarded to the University by the college Principal after obtaining the signature of both course teacher and HOD

INDIRECT GRADING SYSTEM

Indirect grading system based on a 7- point scale is used to evaluate the performance of students.

Each course is evaluated by assigning marks with a letter grade (A+, A, B, C, D, E or F) to that course by the method of indirect grading. An aggregate of E grade with 40% marks (after external and internal put together) is required in each course for a pass and also for awarding a degree.

Appearance for Internal Evaluation (IE) and End Semester Evaluation (external) are compulsory and no grade shall be awarded to a candidate if she/he is absent for IE/ESE or both.

For a pass in each course 40% marks or E grade is necessary. A student who fails to secure a minimum grade for a pass in a course is permitted to write the examination along with the next batch.

After the successful completion of a semester, Semester Grade Point Average(SGPA) of student in that semester is calculated using the formula given below.

For the successful completion of a semester, a student should pass all the courses.

However, a student is permitted to move to the next semester irrespective of SGPA obtained.



SGPA of the student is calculated using the formula

$$\text{SGPA} = \frac{\text{Sum of the credit points of all courses in a semester}}{\text{Total credits in that semester}}$$

The Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) of the student is calculated at the end of a programme. The CGPA of a student determines the overall academic level of the student in a programme and is the criterion for ranking the students. CGPA can be calculated by the following formula.

$$\text{CGPA} = \frac{\text{Total credit points obtained in six semesters}}{\text{Total credits in that semester (120)}}$$

SGPA and CGPA shall be rounded off to two decimal places. CGPA determines the broad academic level of the student in a programme and is the index for ranking students (in terms of grade points).

An overall letter grade (cumulative grade) for the entire programme shall be awarded to a student depending on her/his CGPA (see table I in Annexure- I)

1. Internal Assessment. 2. External Evaluation. 20% weight shall be given to the internal assessment. The remaining 80% shall be for the external evaluation.

1. Internal Assessment

20% of the total marks in each course are for internal examinations. The marks secured for internal assessment only need to be sent to University by the colleges concerned.

The internal assessment shall be based on a predetermined transparent system involving written tests, Class room participation based on attendance in respect of theory courses and lab involvement / records attendance in respect of Practical Courses.

Internal assessment of the project will be based on its content, method of presentation, final conclusion and orientation to research aptitude.

To ensure the transparency of the evaluation process, the internal assessment marks awarded to the students in each course in a



semester shall be notified on the notice board at least one week before the commencement of external examination. There shall not be any chance for improvement for internal marks.

The course teacher(s) shall maintain the academic record of each student registered for the course, which shall be forwarded to the University by the college Principal after obtaining the signature of both course teacher and Head of the Department.

2. External Evaluation

External evaluation carries 80% marks. All question papers shall be set by the University. The external question papers may be of uniform pattern with 80/60 marks (The annexure can be given as Question paper pattern). The courses with 2/3 credits will have an external examination of 2 hours duration with 60 marks and courses with 4/5 credits will have an external examination of 2.5 hours duration with 80 marks.

The external examination in theory courses is to be conducted by the University with question papers by set by external experts. The evaluation of the answer scripts shall be done by examiners based on a well- defined scheme of valuation and answer keys shall be provided by the University.

The external examination in practical courses shall be conducted by two examiners- one internal and an external, the latter appointed by the University.

The project evaluation with viva can be conducted either internal or external which may be decided by the Board of Studies concerned.. After the external evaluation only marks are to be entered in the answer scripts. All other calculations including grading are done by the University.

Revaluation: In the new system of grading, revaluation is permissible. The prevailing rules of revaluation are applicable to CBCSSUG 2019.

Students can apply for photocopies of answer scripts of external examinations. Applications for photocopies/ scrutiny/ revaluation should be submitted within 10 days of publication of results. The fee for this shall be as decided by the University.

Indirect Grading System

Indirect grading System is based on a 10- point scale is used to evaluate the performance of students.

Each course is evaluated by assigning marks with a letter grade (O, A⁺, A, B⁺, B, C, P, F, I or Ab) to that course by the method of indirect grading.



An aggregate of P grade (after external and internal put together) is required in each course for a pass and also for awarding a degree (A minimum of 20% marks in external evaluation is needed for a pass in a course. But no separate pass minimum is needed for internal evaluation).

No separate grade/mark for internal and external will be displayed in the grade card : only an aggregate grade will be displayed. Also the aggregate mark of internal and external is not displayed in the grade card.

A student who fails to secure a minimum grade for a pass in a course is permitted to write the examination along with the next batch. However, a student is permitted to move to the next semester irrespective of SGPA obtained.

SGPA of the student in that semester is calculated using the formula

$$\text{SGPA} = \frac{\text{Sum of the credit points of all course in a Semester}}{\text{Total credits in that semester}}$$

The cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) of the student is calculated at the end of a programme.

The CGPA of a student determines the overall academic level of the student in a programme and is the criterion for ranking the students. CGPA can be calculated by the following formula.

$$\text{CGPA} = \frac{\text{Total credits points obtained in six semesters}}{\text{Total credits acquired (120)}}$$

SGPA and CGPA shall be rounded off to three decimal places. CGPA determines broad academic level of the student in a programme and is the index for ranking students (in terms of grade points).

An overall letter grade (cumulative grade) for the entire programme shall be awarded to a student depending on her/his CGPA (Annexure- I)

**Ability Enhancement Courses/Audit Courses**

There are courses which are mandatory for a programme but not counted for the calculation of SGPA or CGPA. There shall be one Audit course each in the first four semesters. These courses are not meant for class room study. The students can attain only pass (Grade P) for these courses. At the end of each semester there shall be examination conducted by the college from a pool of questions (Question Bank) set by the University. The students can also attain these credits through online courses like SWAYAM, MOOCetc (optional). The list of passed students must be sent to the University from the colleges at least before the fifth semester examination. The lists of courses in each semester with credits are given below.

Internal Evaluation / Continuous Assessment (CA)

This assessment shall be based on a predetermined transparent system involving periodic written tests, assignments, seminars and viva-voce in respect of theory courses and based on tests, lab skill and records/viva in respect of practical courses.

The criteria and percentage of Weightage assigned to various components for internal evaluation are as follows:

Grades shall be given for the internal evaluation are based on the grades A+, A, B, C, D & E with GRADE POINTS 5, 4, 3, 2, 1 & 0 respectively. The overall grades shall be as per the Ten point scale

There shall be no separate minimum Grade Point for internal evaluation. To ensure transparency of the evaluation process, the internal assessment marks awarded to the students in each course in a semester shall be published on the notice board before 5 days of commencement of external examination.

There shall not be any chance for improvement of internal marks.

The course teacher shall maintain academic record of each student registered for the course, which shall be forwarded to the University, through the college Principal, after being endorsed by the Head of the Department.

For each course there shall be class test/s during a semester. Grades should be displayed on the notice board. Valued answer scripts shall be made available to the students for perusal.

Each student shall be required to do assignment/s for each course. Assignments after valuation must be returned to the students.

The teacher shall define the expected quality of the above in terms of structure, content, presentation etc. and inform the same to the students. Punctuality in submissions is to be considered.

Every student shall deliver Seminar / Presentation as an internal component for every course and must be evaluated by the respective course teacher in terms of structure, content, presentation and interaction. The soft and hard copies of the seminar report are to be submitted to the course teacher.

All the records of Continuous Assessment (CA) must be kept in the college and must be made available for verification by University, if asked for.

There shall be an objective test in the nature of Fill in the blanks / Multiple Choice Questions (MCQ) for awarding internal assessment marks for SDE/Private Registration students



External /End Semester Evaluation (ESE)

- The semester- end examinations in theory courses shall be conducted by the University with question papers set by external experts. The evaluation of the answer scripts shall be done by examiners based on a well- defined scheme of valuation.
- After the external evaluation, only Grades are to be entered in the space provided in the answer script for individual questions and calculations need to be done only up to the cumulative Grade Point (CGP) and all other calculations including grades are to be done by the University.
- Students shall have the right to apply for revaluation or scrutiny as per rules within the time permitted for it.
- Photocopies of the answer scripts of the external examination shall be made available to the students for scrutiny on request by them as per rules.
- The external evaluation shall be done immediately after the examination preferably in a centralized valuation camp.
- The language of writing the examination shall be separate regulations for the programme by the concerned BOS.

Question Paper Pattern

Questions shall be set to assess the knowledge acquired, standard, and application of knowledge, application of knowledge in new situations, critical evaluation of knowledge and the ability to synthesize knowledge. Due Weightage shall be given to each module based on content/teaching hours allotted to each module.

1. It has to be ensured that questions covering all skills are set. The setter shall also submit a detailed scheme of evaluation along with the question paper.



2. A question paper shall be a judicious mix of short answer type, short essay type/problem solving type and long essay type questions.
3. The question shall be prepared in such a way that the answers can be awarded A+, A, B, C, D, E Grades.
4. Weightage: Different types of questions shall be given different weightages to quantify their range given in the following model:

6. Questions should be asked as possible from all modules following a uniform distribution. However concerned BoS can change the pattern and type of question subject to the condition that total Weightage should be 30.
- End Semester evaluation in practical courses shall be conducted and evaluated by both Internal and External Examiners as per the stipulations of the concerned BoS. Duration and other aspects of practical external examinations shall be decided by the Boards of Studies concerned.



Audit Courses

In addition to the above courses there will be two Audit Courses (Ability Enhancement Course & Professional Competency Course) with 4 credits each. These have to be done one each in the first two semesters. The credits will not be counted for evaluating the overall SGPA & CGPA.

The colleges shall conduct examination for these courses and have to intimate/upload the results of the same to the University on the stipulated date during the III semester. Students have to obtain only minimum pass requirements in the Audit Courses.

These are the places where they can exchange their ideas and thoughts, practice for their upcoming programmes, and design their fruitful plans for the clubs and forums.



PROCEDURES

GENERAL RULES

Education in its true sense should comprise besides the acquisition of knowledge, the formation of an ideal character by bringing body, mind and heart under discipline and by developing everything that is good and beautiful in human nature. Hence it should be the earnest endeavour of every student. She should be gentle and refined in manners and modest in dress and comportment. The student's registration in the college is considered an expression of willingness to abide by all rules and regulations prevailing in the college. Every student, therefore, is committed to the observance of these rules.

1. Rules of modesty and decorum in dress should be strictly adhered to. A simple chain, a pair of earrings and a wrist watch may be worn. The students shall wear uniforms according to the directions given by the college authorities.
2. It is the responsibility of the students to treat college property with care. They should help to keep the buildings and campus neat and clean. Any damage done by a student to the property of the college or of the other must be compensated either by repair or by replacement. Besides, if the situation warrants, the offenders will be subjected to other disciplinary measures.
3. Students shall endeavour to preserve cleanliness and orderliness in the classrooms, verandah's and college premises. Dislocating chairs and other furniture, dirtying the surroundings by throwing bits of paper, and sprinkling ink on the floor, walls and furniture are not in keeping with the high sense of order and cleanliness expected of a lady. Congregating at the entrance of the college gate, sitting on the steps at the portico and sitting on the parapets create a bad impression and, therefore, are to be avoided.
4. Books, stationery and umbrella should bear the name of the owner. The college will not be responsible for any loss of money or article incurred by the students through their carelessness. They are likewise forbidden to borrow or lend money or article.



5. No magazine, newspaper, mobile phone or Walkman is allowed to be brought to the college or hostel without the permission of the Principal. Mobile phones are strictly prohibited in the campus. Anybody carrying a phone is liable to punishment or fine or both and the phone will be confiscated. Use of mobile phones within the college building is a serious offence against the academic culture and hence it will invite punishment.
6. Strict silence should be observed at all times in the reading room and library and in the classroom during class hours.
7. Attendance and active participation in all activities organized by the college is compulsory.
8. No student should be seen in verandah during the class hours.
9. Irregular attendance, insubordination of lectures, habitual inattention to class work, obscenity in word or deed are sufficient reasons for the permanent or temporary dismissal of student. Minor offences are punishable by fines, loss of attendance etc.
10. No subscription of any kind is allowed without the previous permission of the Principal.
11. Official letters addressed to college authorities should enclose reply postage.
12. Students are not allowed to make complaints in a body or present any collective petition.
13. No notice should be pasted on the notice board without the permission of the Principal. Important notices will be posted on the respective notice boards. It is the responsibility of the students to read these notices and to respond immediately if summoned through them. Students should read the notice put up on the notice board carefully every day morning when they come and in the evening when they leave. All administrative, departmental and activity bulletin boards are for official use only. To tamper with them is a serious offence.



14. The college does not charge any capitation fees nor does it accept any donation as a consideration for admission / appointment.
15. Loss of working days due to unforeseen circumstances will be made up by classes on Saturdays.
16. Students while in the campus should wear their identity cards and it must be produced for all transactions in the college.
17. Generally, no certificate will be issued in less than 48 hours' notice.
18. Fees once paid are non refundable.
19. Any student may be suspended, dismissed or expelled from the college at any time during the year for the following offences:
 - a. Stealing
 - b. Any form of cheating
 - c. Any form of public immorality in campus or during a college function
 - d. Possessing or bringing into campus pornographic materials
 - e. Bringing alcoholic or any intoxicating beverages into the campus. Coming into the campus under the influence of alcohol or prohibited drugs and misbehaving
 - f. Bringing or carrying within the campus fire arms or any lethal weapon.
 - g. Physical assault on others.
 - h. Gross and deliberate discourtesy to college personnel or students on or off the campus.
 - i. Possession or use or trafficking of drugs on the campus.
 - j. Vandalism in campus or of any college property.
 - k. Gambling on campus.
 - l. Tampering with and/or falsification of school or public documents.



- m. Preventing or threatening students or college staff or authorities from discharging their duties or from attending classes or from entering the college premises.
- 20. Study tour may be arranged for the final year students (III DC and II PG) for two days with the consent of the class teacher and head of the department and prior approval of the Principal. Students will not be allowed to go on tour unless they are accompanied by a member of the teaching staff.
- 21. Students are free to meet, write to and talk to the Principal individually about issues related to them or the college administration. But they may not make any complaint in a body or through a collective petition.
- 22. Students may not organize programmes for collecting funds nor may they make any kind of fund- collection in the campus, without the explicit prior permission of the principal.

WARNING AGAINST RAGGING

Ragging is strictly prohibited in the college campus. Ragging means doing of any act, by disorderly conduct, to a student of an educational institution which causes or likely to cause physical or psychological harm or raising apprehension or fear or shame or embarrassment to that students and includes:

- Teasing, abusing, or playing jokes on, or hurting a student
- Asking a student to do any act or perform something which such student will not, in the ordinary course willingly do

If any incident of ragging comes to the notice of the authority, the concerned student will be given liberty to explain, and if her explanation is not found satisfactory, the student will be expelled from the institution.

Any written complaint obtained regarding ragging will also be forwarded to the police authorities. College will not be responsible for the criminal proceedings initiated in this regard.



CODE OF CONDUCT

 - j) Vandalism in campus or of college property.
 - k) Gambling on Campus.
 - l) Tampering with and / or falsification of school or public documents.
 - m) Preventing or threatening students or college staff or authorities from discharging their duties or from attending classes or from entering the college premises.
13. Students may not organize programmes for collecting funds nor may they make any kind of fund- collection in the campus, without the explicit prior permission of the Principal.
14. Ragging is strictly prohibited in the college campus.

TEACHERS

- Commitment to the Profession.
 - 1. Faculties should be strictly adhered to the working hours of the campus and working hours should be dedicated to learning, training and study.
 - 2. Keep ourselves updated. Continuous attempts should be made for professional growth, in particular through involvement in study operations and updating in their region of competence.
 - 3. Create a culture that fosters helpful co-operation between colleagues.
 - 4. Faculty should treat all students and colleagues-teaching and non- teaching with dignity.
 - 5. All academic and administrative roles assigned may be undertaken and performed in the best possible manner.
- Commitment to Colleagues.
 - 6. Faculties should treat peers as equals, irrespective of their status.



7. Other colleagues professional views and recommendations should be respected and considered.
 8. Work in team whenever and wherever necessary.
- Commitment to the Institution.
 9. Be regular and report for courses on time. Unless they are allocated responsibilities elsewhere, teachers should be accessible on campus from 9:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.
 10. Full class hours should be engaged as per schedule.
 11. Teachers may leave the campus only with the approval of the Principal during their working hours.
 12. Teachers should be present in all student programmes to preserve the discipline and promote study.
 - Commitment to Students
 13. Teachers should be accessible to learners, particularly on weekdays, as much as possible.
 14. Teachers should show their dedication to job excellence, manners and accomplishments to learners.
 15. Help students in Physical, Social, Intellectual, Emotional, and Moral Development.
 16. Teachers should uphold human dignity and promote equality of gender, religion.
 17. Help the students to mould themselves to be better citizens and best human beings.
 18. Assist learners in exercising tolerance in their efforts to understand the thoughts and views of others that will equip them.
 19. Under no circumstances should students be exploited for the personal interest of the faculty.



20. Stimulate students' spirit of inquiry.
21. Encourage learners to balance their participation in academic and co-curricular education.
- Commitment to the Community.
 22. Perform citizenship responsibilities and encourage students' participation in social service operations.
 23. Enrich the students through awareness courses and workshops to develop their abilities, self- confidence and understanding.

ADMINISTRATIVE STAFF

1. They should demonstrate courtesy, professionalism, and respect in all dealings with students, academic employees, and support staff.
2. Administrative Staff should imbibe themselves into the policies and procedures of the college, and should be prepared to implement them.
3. Essential support, training and time should be given to the faculties and support staffs who agree to accept assignments currently outside their qualifications and skills but accepted to perform these assignments within their expected potential.
4. Ensure that the work assigned to an employee meets the terms of the employee's job description and the collective agreements and that the duties are appropriate to the qualifications and skills of the employee.
5. Ensure that all expenditures fall within budget and fair bidding practices are observed.
6. Should maintain College funds and practice fiscal responsibility.
7. Maintain cooperative and collegial relationships with other administrative staff members.



8. Demonstrate support to faculty and staff with the tools needed to do their jobs.

SUPPORT STAFF

1. The support staff has to familiarize the College policies to make themselves fit to their best ability.
2. They have to be professional and should be committed to perform the duties assigned to them diligently and with sincerity.
3. The support staff should not undertake any other job within the stipulated office hours.
4. Support Staff are restricted from engaging themselves in political or anti- secular activities, if it affects the functioning of the college.
5. They are insisted to remain respectful and are instructed to maintain the dignity by not engaging themselves in remarks or behavior that might be considered disrespectful to their non-teaching colleagues, teaching staff or students.

CODE OF ETHICS TO CHECK MALPRACTICES AND PLAGIARISM

To simply put, plagiarism is a way of stealing the ideas and words of another and using it as one's own.

1. Plagiarism could be avoided by paraphrasing, citing, quoting and referencing the original work.
2. Institute use plagiarism software so as to ensure that documents such as thesis, dissertation, term papers, reports, publications or any other such documents are free of plagiarism.
3. While submitting a thesis, dissertation, technical papers or any other such documents to the supervisor / guide, every student should submit an undertaking indicating that the document has been prepared by him or her and that the document is his / her original work and free of any plagiarism
4. Every faculty- researcher submitting a thesis, dissertation,



technical papers or any other such documents to the Board of Anti-Plagiarism shall submit an undertaking indicating that the document has been prepared by him or her.

5. The undertaking shall include the fact that the document has been duly checked through a Plagiarism detection tool approved by the institution.
6. Each supervisor / guide shall submit a certificate indicating that the work done by the researcher under him / she is plagiarism free.

3. ATTENDANCE AND LEAVE

1. The working days are divided into two sessions into periods of one hour.
2. The first bell for class is given 10 minutes before the commencement of the morning and afternoon session and the second bell at the hour fixed for the commencement of the class.
3. At the first bell for the morning session, all students shall go to their class's morning payer.
4. Late comers should enter the class with the permission of the Professor Lecturer in charge of that class.
5. Daily Attendance will be taken.
6. No student is allowed to leave class room without the permission of the Lecturer in charge or until the class is dismissed.
7. If a student wants to leave the college during class hours either their parent or guardian should come and get the permission from the Principal.
8. Office provides leave books on payment of Rs. 5/- Application for leave must be recommended by the tutor- in charge. In case of unforeseen circumstances application for leave must be submitted on very first day of students' return to the college.
9. The students who absent herself for a day without leave loses two days attendance. Absence without leave will be penalized at the discretion of the Principal.
10. Absence without leave from examination and on the day of the reopening of the classes after holidays will be dealt with seriously. In case of illness, a Medical certificate should be produced. No re-examination will be conducted for the students who are absent during class tests and terminal examinations.

Absenting students will lose the marks allotted for the particular exam. Their performance in other tests and examination will be the basis for their promotion or failure.



11. A student requiring leave only for the particular hour may be granted such leave by the lecturer in charge.
12. Those who absent themselves without leave or those whose application for leave has been sanctioned for any reason will have to pay a fine of Rs. 1.00 per day. The fines should be paid along with the leave slip.

The Library Committee that includes the Principal, Vice Principal and teachers helps to direct the Library Services.

Library Rules

1. As the Library is a place of individual study, students should conduct themselves inside the Library as to maintain an atmosphere conducive to this. Strict Silence must be observed in the Library, reading room and its immediate premises.
2. Books and other personal belongings should not be taken into the Library. However each student may take papers with her.
3. The Library will be kept open from 8.00 am to 6.00 pm
4. Students without the identity card may not enter the Library.
5. The Library follows open access system.
6. The time schedule for different sections in the Library as follows:-



- a) Reference Section: 8.00 am to 6.00 pm
 - b) Periodicals & Journals: 8.00 am to 6.00 pm
 - c) Book Lending Section: 8.00 am to 4.30 pm
 - d) Internet availability: 8.30 am to 6.00 pm
7. Due date is marked on the label inside the book.
8. If a book is not returned on the due date the student will be charged Rs.1/- per day (Holiday inclusive) per book as fine.
9. The library has been using Koha, an open source integrated library system for academic activities. It allows the following functions. Cataloguing

- Library catalogues are available for reference at the counter, internet browsing, circulation online public access catalogue (OPAC) and computerized searching facility for library holdings are available.
10. It is the duty of the borrowers to take maximum care of the library books issued to them. Please help us to keep the book fresh and clean. Dog-earing the pages of a book, marking or writing therein with ink or pencil, tearing out of its pages, and spoiling of binding will constitute an injury to a book. Any such injury to a book is a serious offence. Unless the borrower points out the injury at the time of borrowing the books, she shall be required to replace the book or pay the price of the latest edition of the book including postage. It is left to the discretion of the authorities to press for a heavier penalty.



11. For loss of books the following procedure will be followed:-
 1. If new edition or copies of the lost books are available with the suppliers the book has to be replaced by a new one.
 2. If the lost book is not available for replacement the value of the lost book will be realized at the following rates:-
 - a. Thrice the face value of the book which are published prior to 1944
 - b. If the book value cannot be ascertained from the Library stock Registers, compensation will be fixed on the basis of the market price of similar publication at the time of fixation.
12. Current periodicals, reference books, rare and out of print books will not be issued to be taken outside the Library.
13. P. G. Students are permitted to take 8 books from their discipline.
 - a) II & III Degree students can have 4 books from their selected discipline and 2 from the general section (General English, Malayalam & Religion)
 - b) Ist Year Degree students can have 3 books from their discipline and 2 from the General Section (General English, Malayalam & Religion)
14. Every user is supposed to enter the details of the books and journals issued as well as referred in the issue register provided at the counter.
15. Students are not allowed to pass books from one person to another or lend to any one in or outside the College. In such cases they will be fined or suspended from membership.
16. A member of teaching staff is allowed to borrow 10 books at a time.



17. A member of non - teaching staff may borrow 4 books at a time from the Library.
18. Staff and students are expected to return their library books before due date.
19. The Library facilities are also extended to the old students considering the lack of library facilities in their locality.
20. Library has book bank facility for the poor students.
21. There are four browsing centers for the students at the located at the library. Two browsing centers are at the ground floor with the total of 25 computers and two are on the second floor with 39 systems. One of the browsing centers on the second floor was built as a part of the Ruby Jubilee year of Carmel college.

HOSTEL

1. Students who do not live with parents, relatives or recognized guardians shall be required to live in hostels approved by the college authorities.
2. Every student shall within the two week, of joining fill up the residence slip and return it to the college office.
3. The hostel is under the direct control of the Principal, who stands as the local guardian to all in residence and under the immediate management of the warden.
4. Information regarding rules, rate of fees etc. can had from the warden and from the college office.



FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

The majority of students at Carmel College receive some measure of financial aid during their career. The amount of support each student receives depends in part upon need; in part upon evidence of intellectual promises or achievements and in part of course, upon the availability of funds. Support range from grants covering tuition charges to awards, sufficient to pay all academic and living expenses.

FEE CONCESSION & STIPEND

Students belonging to Scheduled Castes & Scheduled Tribes are eligible for full fee concession and stipend provided they apply for the same in time. Application forms are available from the office. Besides, mess charge of S.C & S.T students will be met by the government.

OEC students - enjoy the same privileges as SC/ST students. There is no income limit for SC/ST students.

Students of forward communities are eligible for full fee concession provided their income falls below the income limit.

Students belonging OBC are eligible for full fee concession, if their income fall under above limits.

Fee concession to students, whose parents are physically handicapped are eligible for tuition fee & special fee concessions from social welfare department. The income limit is Rs. 12,000/- per annum.

The income certificate obtained from the village officers is a requisite to enjoy the above concession. It will have to be presented at the time of admission.

STUDENTS AID FUND

Assistance from the college student's aid fund is also available to those students whose family income is less than Rs. 1,200/- per annum. They shall apply before September.



SCHOLARSHIPS

1. The necessary information about scholarships is available from the college office.
2. Management Instituted Scholarships for abled Poor Students
3. No student will awarded more than one scholarship, college scholarship and concession.
4. A few poor students are given free education and noon meal by the management.
